12 Preamble

13
14 The licenses for most software are designed to take away your
15 freedom to share and change it. By contrast, the GNU General Public
16 License is intended to guarantee your freedom to share and change free
17 software--to make sure the software is free for all its users. We,
18 the Free Software Foundation, use the GNU General Public License for
19 most of our software; it applies also to any other program whose
20 authors commit to using it. (Some Free Software Foundation software
21 is covered by the GNU Lesser General Public License instead.) You
22 can apply it to your programs, too.

23
24 When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom, not
25 price. Our General Public Licenses are designed to make sure that you
26 have the freedom to distribute copies of free software (and charge for
27 this service if you wish), that you receive source code or can get it
28 if you want it, that you can change the software or use pieces of it
29 in new free programs; and that you know you can do these things.

30
31 To protect your rights, we need to make requirements that forbid
32 anyone to deny you these rights or to ask you to surrender the rights.
33 These restrictions translate to certain responsibilities for you if you
34 distribute copies of the software, or if you modify it.

35
36 For example, if you distribute copies of such a program, whether
37 gratis or for a fee, you must give the recipients all the rights that
38 you have. You must make sure that they, too, receive or can get the
39 source code. And you must show them these terms so they know their
40 rights.

41
42 Developers that use the GNU GPL protect your rights with two steps: (1)
43 assert copyright on the software, and (2) offer you this License which
44 gives you legal permission to copy, distribute and/or modify the software.

45
46 For the developers' and author's protection, the GPL clearly explains
47 that there is no warranty for this free software. If the software is
48 modified by someone else and passed on, the GPL ensures that recipients

49 are told that what they have is not the original, so that any problems
50 introduced by others will not reflect on the original authors'
51 reputations.

52
53 Some countries have adopted laws prohibiting software that enables users
54 to escape from Digital Restrictions Management. DRM is fundamentally
55 incompatible with the purpose of the GPL, which is to protect users'
56 freedom; therefore, the GPL ensures that the software it covers will
57 neither be subject to, nor subject other works to, digital restrictions
58 from which escape is forbidden.

59
60 Finally, every program is threatened constantly by software patents. We
61 wish to avoid the special danger that redistributors of a free program will
62 individually obtain patent licenses, in effect making the program
63 proprietary. To prevent this, the GPL makes it clear that any patent must
64 be licensed for everyone's free use or not licensed at all.

65
66 The precise terms and conditions for copying, distribution and
67 modification follow.

68
69 GNU GENERAL PUBLIC LICENSE
70 TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR COPYING, DISTRIBUTION AND
71 MODIFICATION

72
73 0. Definitions.

74
75 A "licensed program" means any program or other work distributed under
76 this License. The "Program" refers to any such program or work, and a
77 "work based on the Program" means either the Program or any derivative work
78 under copyright law: that is to say, a work containing the Program or a
79 portion of it, either modified or unmodified. Throughout this License, the
80 term "modification" includes, without limitation, translation and
81 extension. A "covered work" means either the Program or any work based on
82 the Program. Each licensee is addressed as "you".

83
84 To "propagate" a work means doing anything with it that requires
85 permission under applicable copyright law, other than executing it on
86 a computer or making private modifications. This includes copying,
87 distribution (with or without modification), sublicensing, and in some
88 countries other activities as well.

89
90 1. Source Code.

91
92 The "source code" for a work means the preferred form of the work
93 for making modifications to it. "Object code" means any non-source
94 version of a work.

95
96 The "Complete Corresponding Source Code" for a work in object code form

97 means all the source code needed to understand, adapt, modify, compile,
98 link, install, and run the work, excluding general-purpose tools used in
99 performing those activities but which are not part of the work. For
100 example, this includes any scripts used to control those activities, and
101 any shared libraries and dynamically linked subprograms that the work is
102 designed to require, such as by intimate data communication or control flow
103 between those subprograms and other parts of the work, and interface
104 definition files associated with the program source files.

105
106 Complete Corresponding Source Code also includes any encryption or
107 authorization codes necessary to install and/or execute the source code of
108 the work, perhaps modified by you, in the recommended or principal context
109 of use, such that its functioning in all circumstances is identical to that
110 of the work, except as altered by your modifications. It also includes any
111 decryption codes necessary to access or unseal the work's output.
112 Notwithstanding this, a code need not be included in cases where use of the
113 work normally implies the user already has it.

114
115 Complete Corresponding Source Code need not include anything that users
116 can regenerate automatically from other parts of the Complete Corresponding
117 Source Code.

118
119 As a special exception, the Complete Corresponding Source Code need
120 not include a particular subunit if (a) the identical subunit is
121 normally included as an adjunct in the distribution of either a major
122 essential component (kernel, window system, and so on) of the
123 operating system on which the executable runs or a compiler used to
124 produce the executable or an object code interpreter used to run it,
125 and (b) the subunit (aside from possible incidental extensions) serves
126 only to enable use of the work with that system component or compiler
127 or interpreter, or to implement a widely used or standard interface,
128 the implementation of which requires no patent license not already
129 generally available for software under this License.

130
131 2. Basic Permissions.

132
133 All rights granted under this License are granted for the term of
134 copyright on the Program, and are irrevocable provided the stated
135 conditions are met. This License explicitly affirms your unlimited
136 permission to run the Program. The output from running it is covered by
137 this License only if the output, given its content, constitutes a work
138 based on the Program. This License acknowledges your rights of "fair use"
139 or other equivalent, as provided by copyright law.

140
141 This License gives unlimited permission to privately modify and run the
142 Program, provided you do not bring suit for patent infringement against
143 anyone for making, using or distributing their own works based on the
144 Program.

145
146 Propagation of covered works is permitted without limitation provided it
147 does not enable parties other than you to make or receive copies.
148 Propagation which does enable them to do so is permitted, as
149 "distribution", under the conditions of sections 4-6 below.

150
151 3. Digital Restrictions Management.

152
153 As a free software license, this License intrinsically disfavors
154 technical attempts to restrict users' freedom to copy, modify, and share
155 copyrighted works. Each of its provisions shall be interpreted in light of
156 this specific declaration of the licensor's intent. Regardless of any
157 other provision of this License, no permission is given to distribute
158 covered works that illegally invade users' privacy, nor for modes of
159 distribution that deny users that run covered works the full exercise of
160 the legal rights granted by this License.

161
162 No covered work constitutes part of an effective technological protection
163 measure: that is to say, distribution of a covered work as part of a system
164 to generate or access certain data constitutes general permission at least
165 for development, distribution and use, under this License, of other
166 software capable of accessing the same data.

167
168 4.[1] Verbatim Copying.

169
170 You may copy and distribute verbatim copies of the Program's source
171 code as you receive it, in any medium, provided that you conspicuously
172 and appropriately publish on each copy an appropriate copyright
173 notice; keep intact all license notices and notices of the absence of
174 any warranty; give all recipients of the Program a copy of this
175 License along with the Program; and obey any additional terms present
176 on parts of the Program in accord with section 7.

177
178 You may charge a fee for the physical act of transferring a copy, and
179 you may at your option offer warranty protection for a fee.

180
181 5.[2] Distributing Modified Source Versions.

182
183 Having modified a copy of the Program under the conditions of section
184 2, thus forming a work based on the Program, you may copy and distribute
185 such modifications or work in the form of source code under the terms of
186 Section 4 above, provided that you also meet all of these conditions:

187
188 a) The modified work must carry prominent notices stating that you
189 changed the work and the date of any change.

190
191 b) You must license the entire modified work, as a whole, under
192 this License to anyone who comes into possession of a copy. This

193 License must apply, unmodified except as permitted by section 7
194 below, to the whole of the work. This License gives no permission
195 to license the work in any other way, but it does not invalidate
196 such permission if you have separately received it.

197
198 c) If the modified work has interactive user interfaces, each must
199 include a convenient feature that displays an appropriate
200 copyright notice, and tells the user that there is no warranty for
201 the program (or that you provide a warranty), that users may
202 redistribute the modified work under these conditions, and how to
203 view a copy of this License together with the central list (if any) of
204 other terms in accord with section 7. If the interface presents a
205 list of user commands or options, such as a menu, a command to
206 display this information must be prominent in the list.
207 Otherwise, the modified work must display this information at
208 startup--except in the case that the Program has such
209 interactive modes and does not display this information at
210 startup.

211
212 These requirements apply to the modified work as a whole. If
213 identifiable sections of that work, added by you, are not derived from
214 the Program, and can be reasonably considered independent and separate

224

235 the individual works permit. Mere inclusion of a covered work in an

238
239 6.[3] Non-Source Distribution.
240

241 You may copy and distribute a covered work in Object Code form under the
242 terms of Sections 4 and 5, provided that you also distribute the
243 machine-readable Complete Corresponding Source Code (herein the
244 "Corresponding Source") under the terms of this License, in one of these
245 ways:

246
247 a) Distribute the Object Code in a physical product (including a
248 physical distribution medium), accompanied by the Corresponding Source
249 distributed on a durable physical medium customarily used for software
250 interchange; or,

251
252 b) Distribute the Object Code in a physical product (including a
253 physical distribution medium), accompanied by a written offer, valid
254 for at least three years and valid for as long as you offer spare parts
255 or customer support for that product model, to give any third party,
256 for a price no more than ten times your cost of physically performing
257 source distribution, a copy of the Corresponding Source for all the
258 software in the product that is covered by this License, on a durable
259 physical medium customarily used for software interchange; or,

260
261 c) Privately distribute the Object Code with a copy of the written
262 offer to provide the Corresponding Source. This alternative is
263 allowed only for occasional noncommercial distribution, and only
264 if you received the Object Code with such an offer, in accord with
265 Subsection b above. Or,

266
267 d) Distribute the Object Code by offering access to copy it
268 from a designated place, and offer equivalent access to copy
269 the Corresponding Source in the same way through the same place.
270 You need not require recipients to copy the Corresponding Source
271 along with the Object Code.

272
273 [If the place to copy the Object Code is a network server, the
274 Corresponding Source may be on a different server that supports
275 equivalent copying facilities, provided you have explicitly
276 arranged with the operator of that server to keep the
277 Corresponding Source available for as long as needed to satisfy
278 these requirements, and provided you maintain clear directions
279 next to the Object Code saying where to find the Corresponding
280 Source.]

281
282 Distribution of the Corresponding Source in accord with this section
283 must be in a format that is publicly documented, unencumbered by
284 patents, and must require no special password or key for unpacking,
285 reading or copying.

286
287 The Corresponding Source may include portions which do not formally
288 state this License as their license, but qualify under section 7

289 for inclusion in a work under this License.

290

291 7. License Compatibility.

292

293 When you release a work based on the Program, you may include your own
294 terms covering added parts for which you have, or can give,
295 appropriate copyright permission, as long as those terms clearly permit
296 all the activities that this License permits, or permit usage or
297 relicensing under this License. Your terms may be written separately or
298 may be this License plus additional written permission. If you so license
299 your own added parts, those parts may be used separately under your
300 terms, but the entire work remains under this License. Those who copy
301 the work, or works based on it, must preserve your terms just as they
302 must preserve this License, as long as any substantial portion of the parts
303 they apply to are present.

304

305 Aside from additional permissions, your terms may add limited kinds of
306 additional requirements on your added parts, as follows:

307

308 a) They may require the preservation of certain copyright notices,
309 other legal notices, and/or author attributions, and may require
310 that the origin of the parts they cover not be misrepresented,
311 and/or that altered versions of them be marked in the source code,
312 or marked there in specific reasonable ways, as different from the
313 original version.

314

315 b) They may state a disclaimer of warranty and liability in terms
316 different from those used in this License.

317

318 c) They may prohibit or limit the use for publicity purposes of specified
319 names of contributors, and they may require that certain specified
320 trademarks be used for publicity purposes only in the ways that are
321 fair use under trademark law except with express permission.

322

323 d) They may require that the work contain functioning facilities that
324 allow users to immediately obtain copies of its Complete Corresponding
325 Source Code.

326

327 e) They may impose software patent retaliation, which means permission
328 for use of your added parts terminates or may be terminated, wholly or
329 partially, under stated conditions, for users closely related to any
330 party that has filed a software patent lawsuit (i.e., a lawsuit
331 alleging that some software infringes a patent). The conditions must
332 limit retaliation to a subset of these two cases: 1. Lawsuits that lack
333 the justification of retaliating against other software patent lawsuits
334 that lack such justification. 2. Lawsuits that target part of this
335 work, or other code that was elsewhere released together with the parts
336 you added, the whole being under the terms used here for those parts.

337
338 No other additional conditions are permitted in your terms; therefore, no
339 other conditions can be present on any work that uses this License. This
340 License does not attempt to enforce your terms, or assert that they are
341 valid or enforceable by you; it simply does not prohibit you from employing
342 them.

343
344 When others modify the work, if they modify your parts of it, they may
345 release such parts of their versions under this License without additional
346 permissions, by including notice to that effect, or by deleting the notice
347 that gives specific permissions in addition to this License. Then any
348 broader permissions granted by your terms which are not granted by this
349 License will not apply to their modifications, or to the modified versions
350 of your parts resulting from their modifications. However, the specific
351 requirements of your terms will still apply to whatever was derived from
352 your added parts.

353
354 Unless the work also permits distribution under a previous version of
355 this License, all the other terms included in the work under this section
356 must be listed, together, in a central list in the work.

357
358 8.[4] Termination.

359
360 You may not propagate, modify or sublicense the Program except as
361 expressly provided under this License. Any attempt otherwise to
362 propagate, modify or sublicense the Program is void, and any copyright
363 holder may terminate your rights under this License at any time after
364 having notified you of the violation by any reasonable means within 60
365 days of any occurrence. However, parties who have received copies, or
366 rights, from you under this License will not have their licenses
367 terminated so long as they remain in full compliance.

368
369 9.[5] Not a Contract.

370
371 You are not required to accept this License in order to receive a copy of
372 the Program. However, nothing else grants you permission to propagate or
373 modify the Program or any covered works. These actions infringe copyright
374 if you do not accept this License. Therefore, by modifying or propagating
375 the Program (or any covered work), you indicate your acceptance of this
376 License to do so, and all its terms and conditions.

377
378 10.[6] Automatic Licensing of Downstream Users.

379
380 Each time you redistribute a covered work, the recipient automatically
381 receives a license from the original licensors, to propagate and modify
382 that work, subject to this License, including any additional terms
383 introduced through section 7. You may not impose any further restrictions
384 on the recipients' exercise of the rights thus granted or affirmed, except

385 (when modifying the work) in the limited ways permitted by section 7. You
386 are not responsible for enforcing compliance by third parties to this
387 License.

388 389 11. Licensing of Patents.

390
391 When you distribute a covered work, you grant a patent license to
392 the recipient, and to anyone that receives any version of the work,
393 permitting, for any and all versions of the covered work, all
394 activities allowed or contemplated by this License, such as
395 installing, running and distributing versions of the work, and using
396 their output. This patent license is nonexclusive, royalty-free and
397 worldwide, and covers all patent claims you control or have the right
398 to sublicense, at the time you distribute the covered work or in the
399 future, that would be infringed or violated by the covered work or any
400 reasonably contemplated use of the covered work.

401
402 If you distribute a covered work knowingly relying on a patent license,
403 you must act to shield downstream users against the possible patent
404 infringement claims from which your license protects you.

405 406 12.[7] Liberty or Death for the Program.

407
408 If conditions are imposed on you (whether by court order, agreement or
409 otherwise) that contradict the conditions of this License, they do not
410 excuse you from the conditions of this License. If you cannot distribute
411 the Program, or other covered work, so as to satisfy simultaneously your
412 obligations under this License and any other pertinent obligations, then as
413 a consequence you may not distribute it at all. For example, if a patent
414 license would not permit royalty-free redistribution by all those who
415 receive copies directly or indirectly through you, then the only way you
416 could satisfy both it and this License would be to refrain entirely from
417 distribution.

418
419 It is not the purpose of this section to induce you to infringe any
420 patents or other exclusive rights or to contest their legal validity.

428 429 [13.[8] Geographical Limitations.

430
431 If the distribution and/or use of the Program is restricted in certain
432 countries either by patents or by copyrighted interfaces, the original

433 copyright holder who places the Program under this License may add an
434 explicit geographical distribution limitation excluding those countries,
435 so that distribution is permitted only in or among countries not thus
436 excluded. In such case, this License incorporates the limitation as if
437 written in the body of this License.]

438
439 14.[9] Revised Versions of this License.

440
441 The Free Software Foundation may publish revised and/or new versions of
442 the GNU General Public License from time to time. Such new versions will
443 be similar in spirit to the present version, but may differ in detail to
444 address new problems or concerns.

445
446 Each version is given a distinguishing version number. If the Program
447 specifies that a certain numbered version of this License "or any

455

465
466 16.[11] There is no warranty for the Program, to the extent permitted by
467 applicable law. Except when otherwise stated in writing the copyright
468 holders and/or other parties provide the Program "as is" without warranty
469 of any kind, either expressed or implied, including, but not limited to,
470 the implied warranties of merchantability and fitness for a particular
471 purpose. The entire risk as to the quality and performance of the Program
472 is with you. Should the Program prove defective, you assume the cost of
473 all necessary servicing, repair or correction.

474
475 17.[12] In no event unless required by applicable law or agreed to in writing
476 will any copyright holder, or any other party who may modify and/or
477 redistribute the Program as permitted above, be liable to you for damages,
478 including any general, special, incidental or consequential damages arising
479 out of the use or inability to use the Program (including but not limited
480 to loss of data or data being rendered inaccurate or losses sustained by

481 you or third parties or a failure of the Program to operate with any other
482 programs), even if such holder or other party has been advised of the
483 possibility of such damages.

484
485 18. Unless specifically stated, the Program has not been tested for use
486 in safety critical systems.

487
488 END OF TERMS AND CONDITIONS

489
490 How to Apply These Terms to Your New Programs

491
492 If you develop a new program, and you want it to be of the greatest
493 possible use to the public, the best way to achieve this is to make it
494 free software which everyone can redistribute and change under these terms.

495
496 To do so, attach the following notices to the program. It is safest

519 Also add information on how to contact you by electronic and paper mail.

521 If the program does terminal interaction, make it output a short
522 notice like this when it starts in an interactive mode:

525 Gnomovision comes with ABSOLUTELY NO WARRANTY; for details type `show w'.

526 This is free software, and you are welcome to redistribute it

529 The hypothetical commands `show w` and `show c` should show the appropriate
530 parts of the General Public License. Of course, the commands you use may
531 be called something other than `show w` and `show c`; for a GUI interface,
532 you would use an "About box" instead.

533

534 You should also get your employer (if you work as a programmer) or your
535 school, if any, to sign a "copyright disclaimer" for the program, if
536 necessary. Here is a sample; alter the names:

538 Yoyodyne, Inc., hereby disclaims all copyright interest in the program
539 `Gnomovision' (which makes passes at compilers) written by James Hacker.

547 The GNU General Public License does not permit incorporating your program
548 into proprietary programs. If your program is a subroutine library, you
